FOUND ART

When Franklin & Marshall senior Kaitlin Dunn discovered a pair of 4-foot-by-6-foot canvases stored away in the College's permanent collection two years ago, she wondered about its artist, Eleanor Lockspeiser. When Dunn began researching the large diptych in the collection, records showed only a title, *The Procession*. An exhibition of Lockspeiser's work, curated by Dunn, from the Phillips Museum of Art's collection will be on
